She was invited to deliver the prestigious South Asia Brown Bag Series Lecture on "Tradition and Modernity: Globalization and the Making of Indian Womanhood" at the Diether H. Haenick Institute for Global Education, Western Michigan University, in October 2011, and was invited as Guest Faculty to deliver lectures at the School of Religion, Claremont Graduate University, USA in 2011 and 2009 respectively. She was also invited as Guest Speaker at the Asia-Pacific Women's Conference on Peace and Security: Vision for the Future, Philippines, in September, 2009. She also presented paper on 'Identity beyond Violence: Towards a Recognition of the Self', at the Conference on Self, Knowledge and Reality in Indian Tradition, at University of California, Berkeley, US in October, 2009. She was awarded ICHR-JRF for her doctoral research, and was selected for the ICCR fellowship in 2003. The ICCR also published her monograph Women in Manusmriti in 2006. Her other book is Gender Relations in Early India, published by Rawat Publications in 2010. Besides this, she has published in one international and some national journals, as well as has contributed chapters to books. She has made several presentations at international and national conferences both in India and abroad. Her areas of academic interest include Women's/ Gender Studies, Development Studies and Women's History.

- MA in Exclusion Studies: The category of socially excluded people represents perspective to studying and understanding Indian society and history, recent experiences of colonialism and nationalism, democracy, modernity and the larger society world over. So-to-say, more importantly, social exclusion is not a singular experience. What holds the socially excluded groups together is the structural fact that they have all been historically socially excluded, that is, subjected to exclusion of varying degrees and the rejection of their identity. Once Social Exclusion Studies emerge as an academic discipline, a social exclusion perspective would become a space that the mainstream can seek to occupy and social exclusion would settle into becoming yet another approach for an understanding of the world around us. This also gives us a vision for the Centre.
- 2. Certificate Course in Media, Culture and Exclusion: Social media is an emerging expression of new communication and technology. The structure of media is a function of the culture of a society and is being experienced promoting the social exclusion in our system. Hence it is one of the potentials areas of research.

Further, the Centre is looking forward to national and international collaborations, student exchange programs.

The Centre is also planning a number of student development initiatives like:

- Personality Development Programme (also including enhancement of linguistic proficiency of students).
